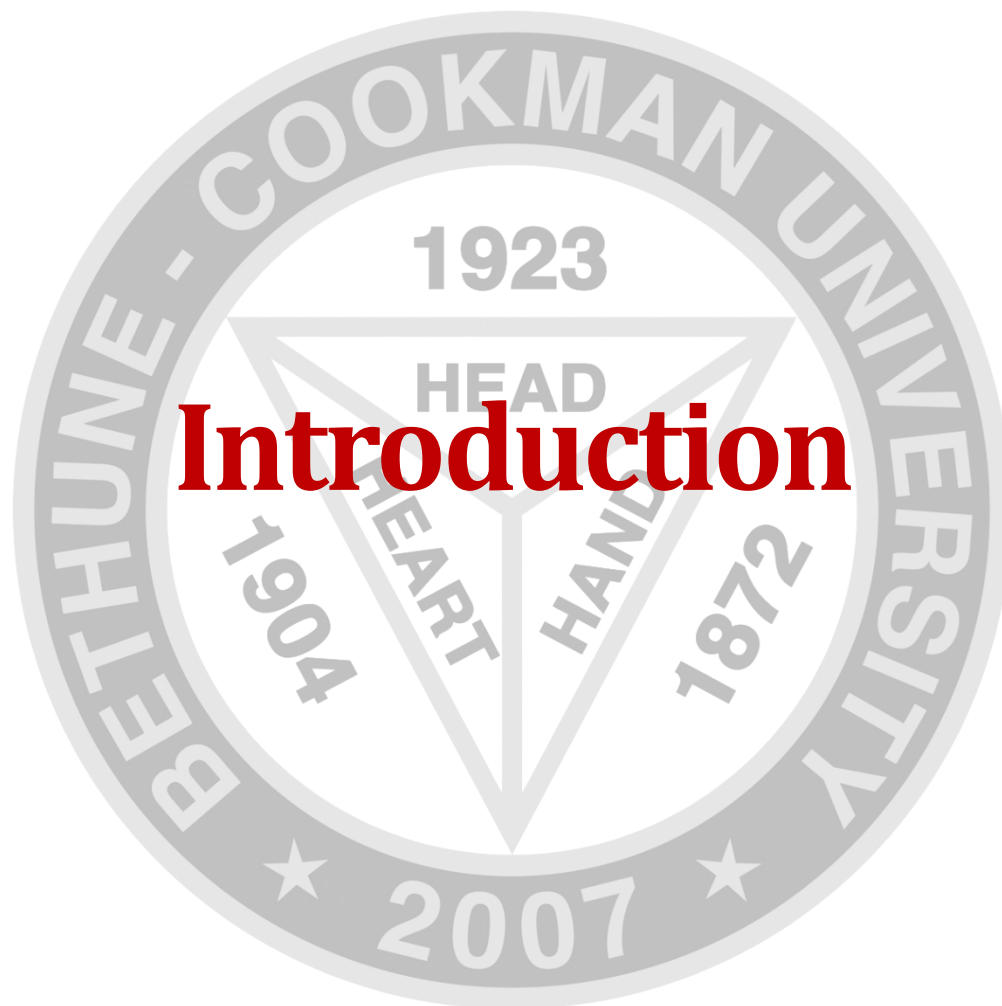

Founded on faith by Mary McLeod Bethune in 1904, Bethune-Cookman University (B-CU), formed in 1923 as a result of a merger of two independent institutions — Daytona Educational and Industrial Training School for Negro Girls (1904) and Cookman Institute of Jacksonville (1872), is an historically black United Methodist Church-related, private liberal arts, career-oriented, coeducational and residential university offering undergraduate, graduate and certificate programs.

About the Office of Accreditation, Quality Control, Compliance, and Institutional Effectiveness

The mission of the Office of Accreditation, Quality Control, Compliance and Institutional Effectiveness ("Office") is to build capacity for a culture of evidence and continuous improvement. We support the University's mission, core values and pursuit of academic and operational excellence through the collection, analysis and reporting of data that informs the strategic planning process, promotes effective allocation of resources, engages faculty and staff in the continuous improvement of the institution's programs and services, and provides accountability to stakeholders.

The Office of Accreditation, Quality Control, Compliance and Institutional Effectiveness is comprised of Planning, Assessment, and Institutional Research. The Office assists in developing, organizing, maintaining, analyzing and reporting institutional data. It is engaged in ongoing data collection, analysis and distribution resulting in official university statistics to satisfy both internal and external reporting needs. The Office also aids in establishing outcome measures for accountability and other related activities in support of planning, evaluation and decision-making.

The information generated by Institutional Research (IR) can be applied in understanding, interpreting, managing and evaluating the institution, and in making informed decisions about current operations or future plans. The following are major functions of the Office of Accreditation, Compliance and Institutional Effectiveness:

- To develop and maintain a technological retrieval database of information that will assist in decision-making pertaining to students, faculty, staff, academic affairs, fiscal resources, library, physical plant and other areas as deemed necessary.
- To provide accurate and timely data for mandatory reports, surveys, etc. required from IEC by federal, state, accrediting, and other agencies.

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University Profile

BETHUNE-COOKMAN UNIVERSITY PROFILE

Fall 2023

Bethune-Cookman University (B-CU), founded in 1904 by Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, is a historically Black, United Methodist Church-related, private, coeducational, residential university offering undergraduate and graduate degrees, and non-degree certificate programs. Located in the Atlantic coast city of Daytona Beach, Florida, the University's main campus consisting of 66 academic, administrative, and student support buildings spanning over 86 acres of land is accessible from interstate highways 4 and 95, and Daytona Beach International Airport. B-CU operates John Miller Center, an off-campus instructional site located in Hastings, Florida, to offer six undergraduate degree programs and relevant courses through weekend and evening classes.

B-CU is classified by The Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education as Baccalaureate Colleges: Arts & Sciences Focus. The University is authorized by the Florida Commission for Independent Education to operate in the state of Florida and is a member of the National Council for State Authorization Reciprocity Agreements (NC-SARA).

Bethune-Cookman University is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) to award the baccalaureate and master's degrees. B-CU is also accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN); the Accreditation Commission for Programs in Hospitality Administration (ACPHA); Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP) and Florida Department of Education (FLDOE); Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET); the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM); Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP); Commission on Accreditation for Athletic Training Education (CAATE); and Council on Education for Public Health (CEPH). Additionally, B-CU is recognized as a Program of Merit (POM) by the Academy for Gerontology in Higher Education.

B-CU is approved for listing as a United Methodist Church-affiliated University by the University Senate of General Board of Higher Education and Ministry (GBHEM) of the United Methodist Church and is a member of the United Negro College Fund (UNCF). B-CU is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) participating in Division I and is affiliated with the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) since 2021. B-CU offers athletic opportunities in varsity sports for Women in basketball, softball, tennis, track/field, cross-country, volleyball and golf; and for Men in baseball, basketball, football, track/field, cross-country.

B-CU offers 43 Degree programs (33 undergraduate; 9 graduate; 1 accelerated 3+2) through four academic Colleges: Business & Entrepreneurship; Arts and Humanities; Nursing and Health Sciences; Science, Engineering & Mathematics to award Bachelor's and Master's degrees. Top five undergraduate fields of study are Business Administration, Pre-Nursing, Health and Exercise Science, Psychology, and Criminal Justice.

Total Full-Time teaching faculty = 139, of whom 65% hold terminal degrees and 24% have tenure. Faculty-student ratio = 1:14

During the 2022-23 academic year, B-CU awarded 373 degrees (338 Bachelor's; 35 Master's) and 1 Post-Baccalaureate Certificate. Retention of first-year students returning for a second year is 57% and six-year cohort graduation rate is 28%. Our graduates are deeply employed in sectors such as business, education, media, government, medical and healthcare.

Fall 2023 Headcount Enrollment = 2,516 (2,415 Undergraduate; 101 Graduate). Total Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) = 2,469. Of the total students enrolled, 63% are female and 37% are male students; 75% are from Florida, 22% are from out-of-state; and 3% represent the Caribbean Islands and over 20 foreign countries.

Currently there are 14 University operated residential facilities to house over 2,000 students. There are approximately 40 chartered student organizations including social fraternities and sororities.

2023-24 Undergraduate Annual tuition/fees = \$14,794; Room/Board = \$10,396; Total Cost of Attendance is \$25,190.

History of Bethune-Cookman University

The year was 1904 when a very determined young Black woman, Mary McLeod Bethune, opened the Daytona Educational and Industrial Training School for Negro Girls. The school underwent several stages of growth and development throughout the following years and, in 1923, as a result of a merger with the Cookman Institute of Jacksonville, Florida, became a co-ed high school. One year later, in 1924, the school became affiliated with The United Methodist Church and, in 1931, further evolved into a junior college known as Bethune-Cookman College. On February 14, 2007, Bethune-Cookman achieved university status.

In 1941, the Florida State Department of Education approved a 4-year baccalaureate program offering post-secondary and teacher education. Dr. Bethune retired in 1942 at which time James E. Colston became the College's second president, having served until 1946 when Dr. Bethune resumed the presidency for a year.

In 1947, Richard V. Moore Sr. was named as the third president of the institution. Under his tenure, the curriculum expanded; student enrollment increased; new buildings were constructed for residential housing and classrooms; the College became accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools; and, in 1970, joined the United Negro College Fund as well as other academic and professional organizations.

Oswald P. Bronson Sr., PhD, an alumnus of the College, served as the fourth and longest serving president of the College from 1975 to 2004. During his tenure, increased student enrollment led to continuous development and expansion of the College. A rapidly increasing student enrollment led to construction of additional student housing, classroom buildings, and a state of the art Performing Arts Center. Major fields of study increased from 12 in 1974 to 37 by 2003. In addition, seven continuing education centers for students began operating throughout the state of Florida. While maintaining accreditation by SACS, the Florida State Board of Education, and its affiliation with The University Senate of The United Methodist Church General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, the College added new accreditations in the Nursing and the Teacher Education programs.

In August 2004, Trudie Kibbe Reed, Ed.D. was appointed to the presidency by the Board of Trustees. The fifth president of the institution, Dr. Reed was the first woman to serve in this capacity since Dr. Bethune. Under her leadership, in 2006 the first Master's degree program was added, and in 2007 the College achieved university-status, officially becoming Bethune-Cookman University. Further, Dr. Reed launched the International Institute for Civic Participation and Social Responsibility as a way to increase student learning about citizenship and leadership development. Additionally, the University's physical plan expanded and improved with the purchase of nearby properties and construction, which included the Michael and Libby Johnson Center for Civic Engagement, the L. Gale Lemerand School of Nursing Building, Lee Rhyant Residential Life Center, and the Alexis Pugh and Eugene Zimmerman Scholarship Houses.

In May 2012, the Board of Trustees appointed Edison O. Jackson, Ed.D. as Interim President and in March 2013 he was appointed to serve as the sixth president of Bethune-Cookman University. Under Dr. Jackson's leadership, the University increased enrollment; added new undergraduate and graduate degree programs as well as program accreditations; increased internship and study-abroad opportunities; established the Online College, the Center for Entrepreneurship & Economic Development (B-CU CEED), and the Mike Curb Institute; strengthened its town and gown relationships; and enhanced the infrastructure through new construction and expansive renovations. Upon his resignation in July 2017, the Board of Trustees appointed Judge Hubert L. Grimes (retired) as Interim President. Prior to this appointment, Judge Grimes served as the University's General Counsel and Director of the Center for Law and Social Justice.

On July 1, 2019, following a national search, the Board of Trustees appointed E. LaBrent Chrite, PhD to serve as the seventh president of B-CU. Dr. Chrite brings extensive global and executive academic leadership experience. Since his arrival, he has focused on the placement of talented and capable leaders as well as the reorganization of key departments in support of the University's vision. His strategic efforts and innovation have included an overhaul of the academic enterprise, enhanced student support systems, and improved fiscal stability and constituent relationships. In April 2021, upon Dr. Chrite's resignation, the Board appointed Hiram C. Powell, PhD, Dean of Performing Arts and Communications to serve as the Interim President of B-CU. Dr. Powell retired in June 2022 and the Board appointed Lawrence M. Drake II, PhD, Dean of the College of Business and Entrepreneurship to serve as the Interim President of B-CU. After Dr. Drake's term ended in June 2023 the Board appointed William Berry, PhD, Senior Vice President & Provost to serve as the Acting President of B-CU.

- 1904 Began as Daytona Educational and Industrial Training School for Negro Girls
- 1923 Merged with the Cookman Institute of Jacksonville, Florida to become a co-ed high school
- 1924 Affiliated with The United Methodist Church; evolved into a junior college called Bethune-Cookman College
- 1931 Received full accreditation from Southern Association of Colleges and Schools
- 1941 Four-year baccalaureate program for liberal arts and teacher education was approved by the Florida Department of Education
- 2007 Achieved University status

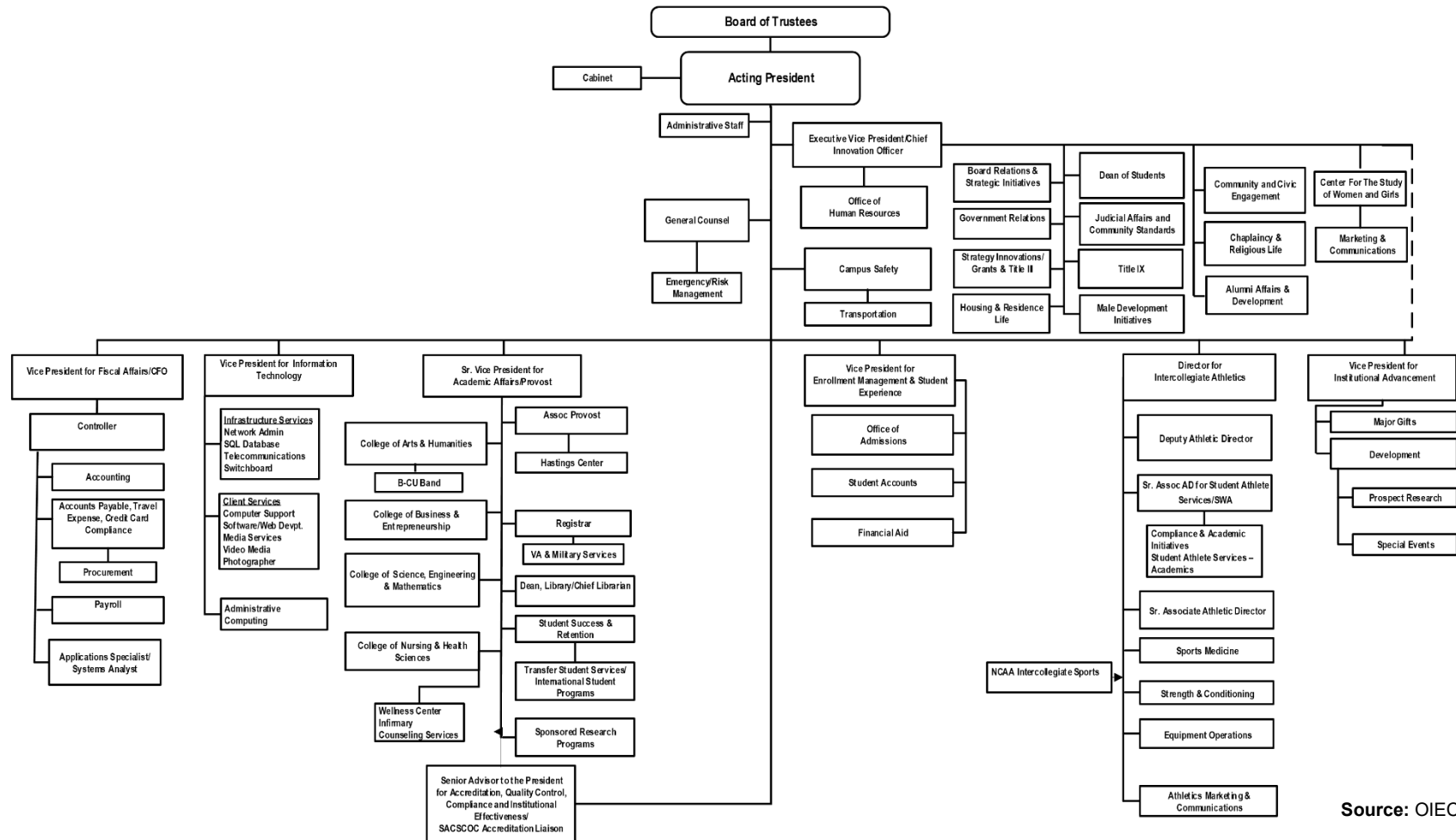

Full-Time Instructional Faculty Distribution Fall 2023

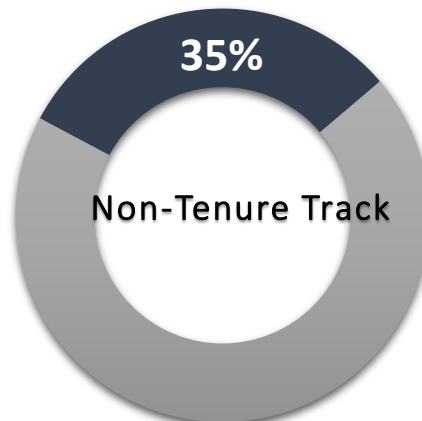
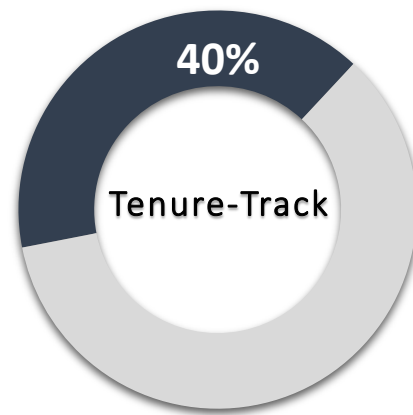
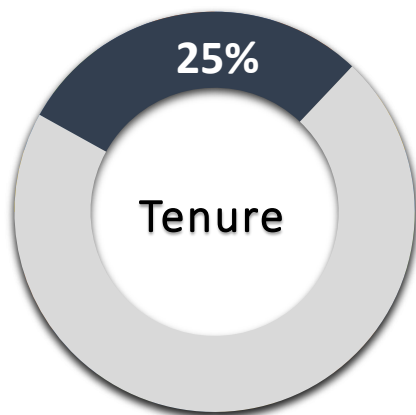

Undergraduate and First-Year Degree Seeking Enrollment by Ethnicity Fall 2023

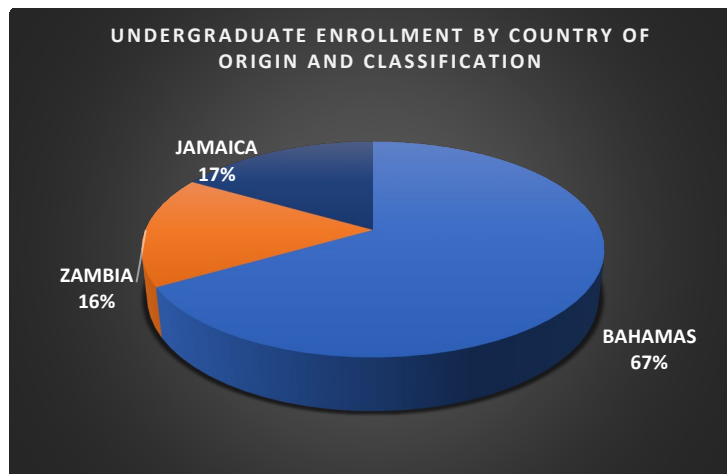

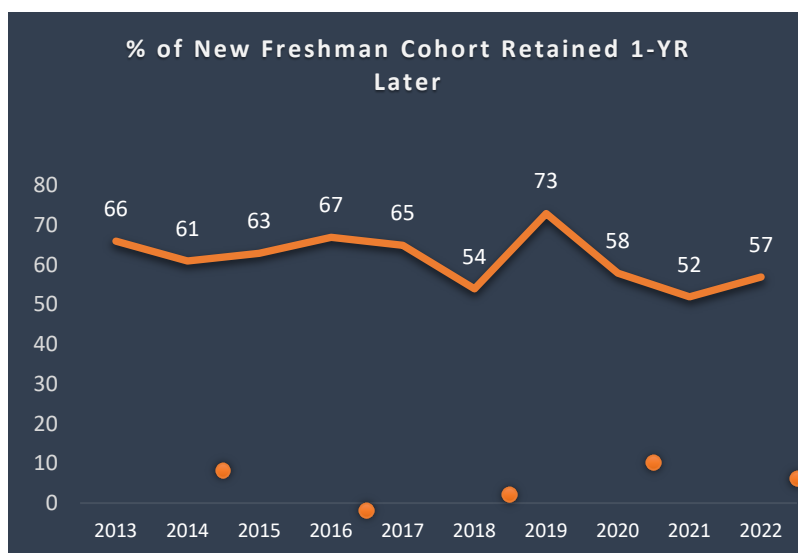
Student Retention and Graduation Rates

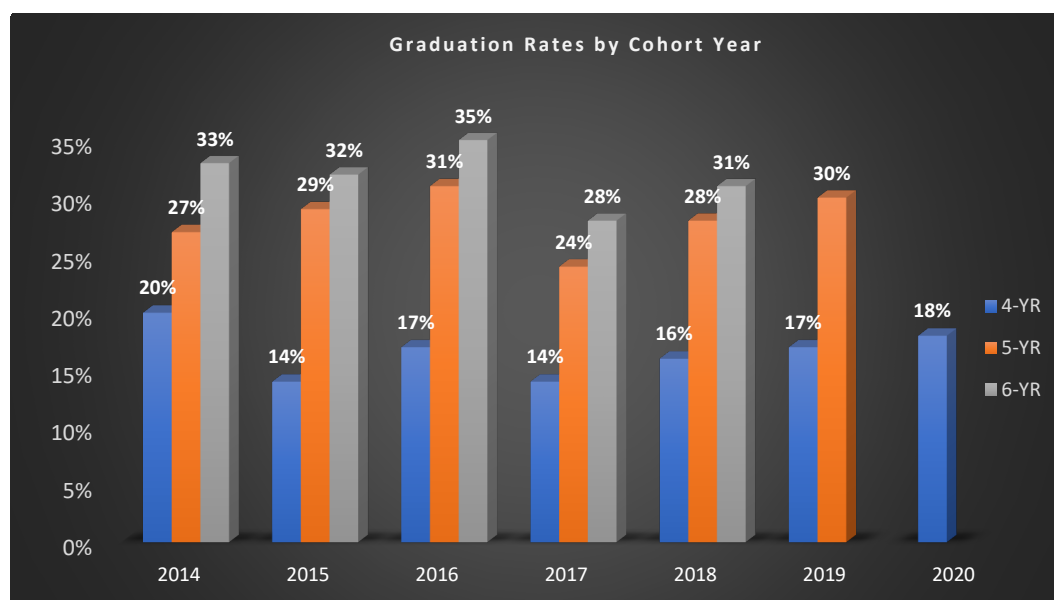

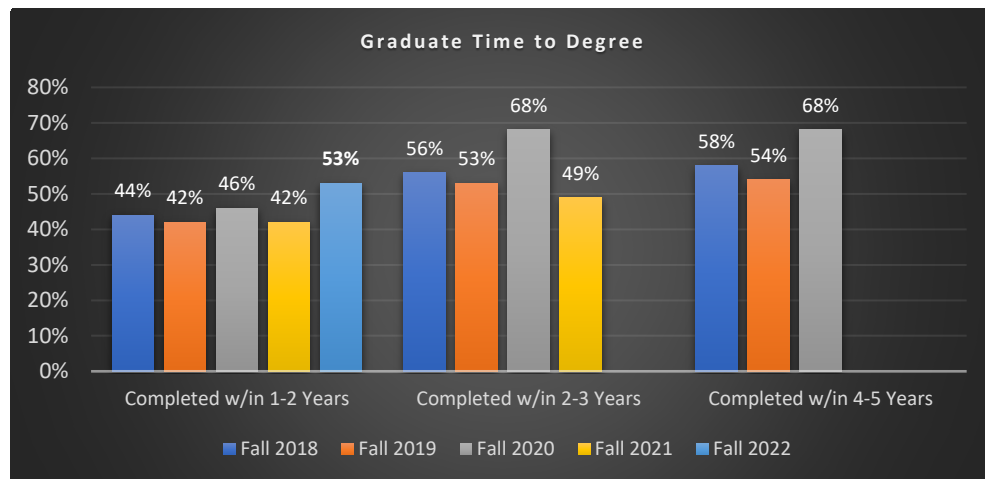

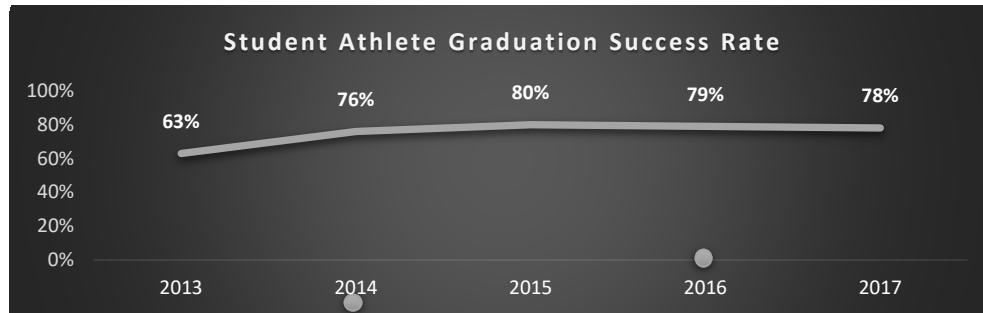

Undergraduate Student-Athlete Six-Year Graduation Rate

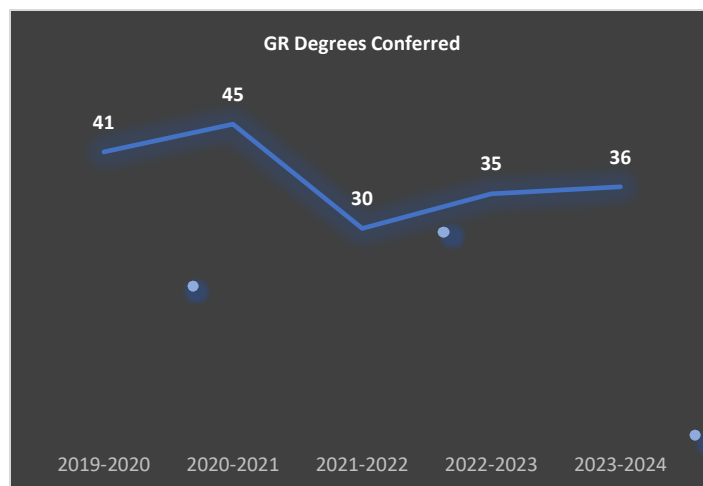
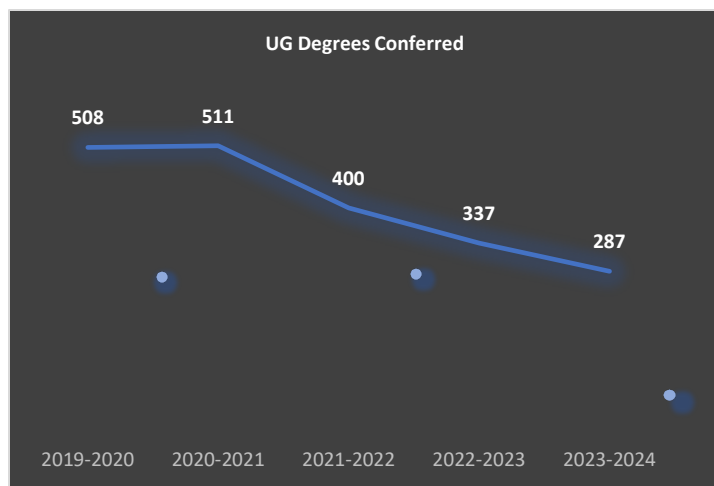

Library & Learning Resources



About the Carl S. Swisher Library and Learning Resources Center



The ***Carl S. Swisher Library & Learning Resources Center*** (LRC) was constructed in 1971 and now contains over 140,000 volumes, in addition to periodicals, audio and video tapes, microforms and other non-print materials. The library is open over 90 hours per week including evenings and weekends. It has a full-time staff of eight librarians and six support staff members. The library serves the entire campus of faculty, staff, students, and administrators, satellite campuses, as well as other community constituents.

The library/learning resources center features an Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC) that provides access to the library's collection via the Internet. In addition, it also provides access to a number of subscribed electronic databases available 24/7, both on-campus and remotely, from any online computer station. These databases feature electronic periodicals, newspapers, and electronic books in support of the academic programs. The electronic resources are particularly tailored to support the undergraduate distance learning programs, and the graduate and professional studies programs.

The library/learning resources center offers a number of services, including reference, research instruction, copy and fax service, non-print media service, interlibrary loan (ILL) and computer access. All services are offered during hours of operation.

The Carl S. Swisher Library/Learning Resources Center houses a number of conference rooms for group study, exhibition areas, computer center, learning commons, and college archives. Special collections include: the Mary McLeod Bethune, Florence Roane, Attica Collection, and the Black Collection of books by and about Blacks. The archival area is the repository for documents, photographs and other materials of historic value to the university.

The library falls under the administrative Office of the Provost and receives system support from the Center for Information Technology.

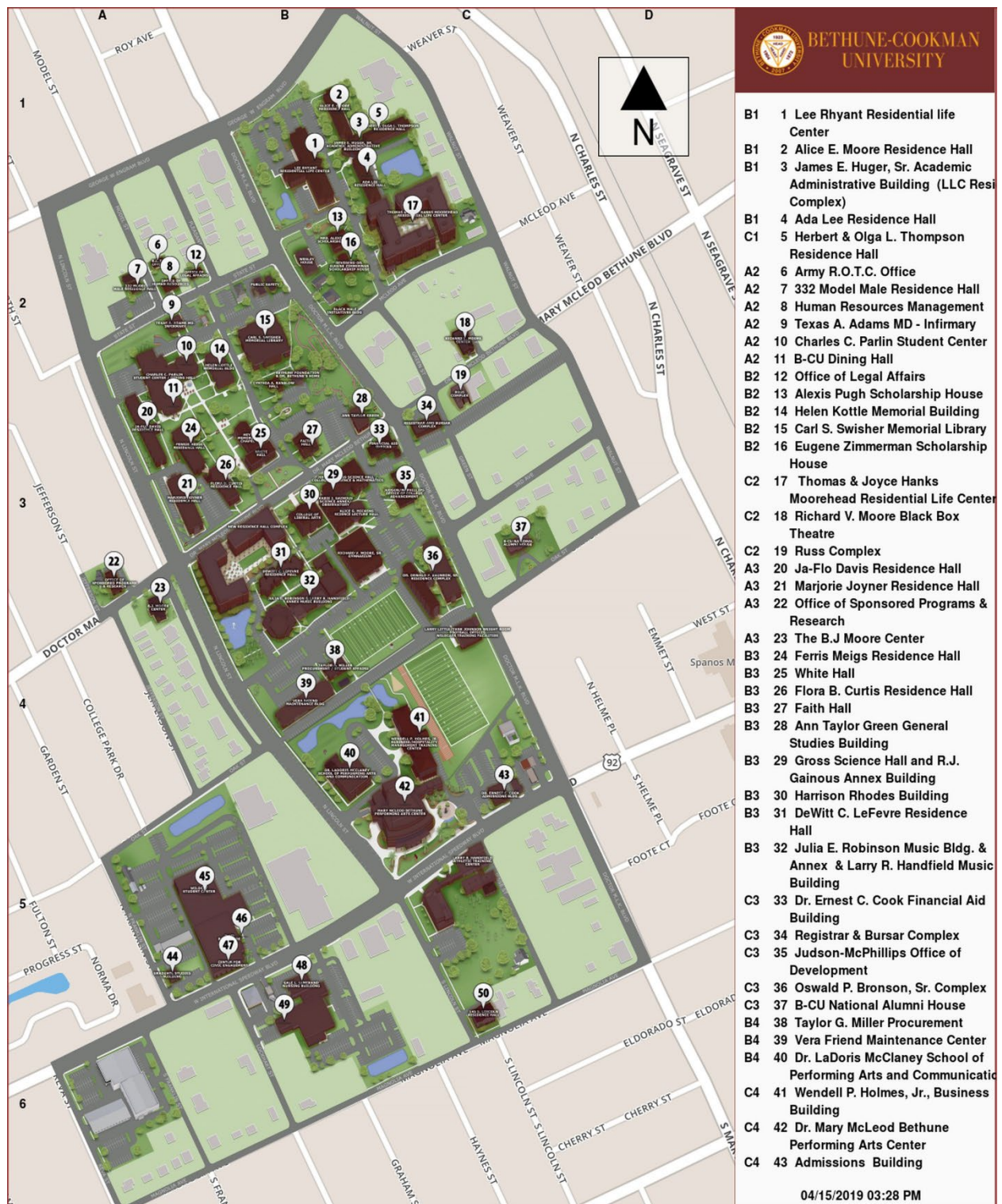
